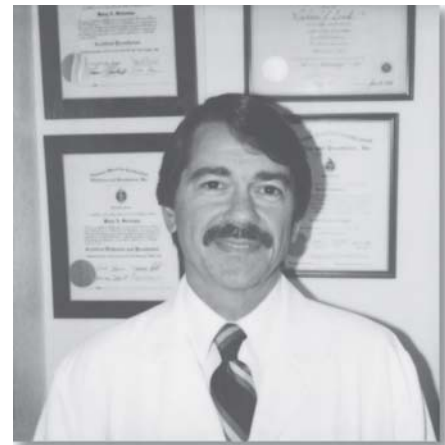

I began working full-time as the Board Director in June because of my other work obligations. Since then my life has been in a whirlwind. I was very busy with the Board creating application forms for orthotics, prosthetics, and pedorthics. I then was responsible in sending out 1,200 press letters to practitioners in Ohio and the surrounding states educating them with the new law and the "grandfathering" provision. It was almost instantaneous that I began getting abundant responses to the letter. Applications were being faxed, e-mailed, and sent out in the mail from my very small temporary office. Because this is a new Board and our deadlines are so near there isn't time to "shop" for office space. My time is dedicated primarily to the Practitioners and the Board. My immediate goal is to make myself available for phone calls, e-mails, and processing applications as they arrive in the office. I really enjoy the fast, busy, and somewhat hectic environment that this new job has provided so far. I would have to say that talking to and answering questions for practitioners is what I have enjoyed the most.

Persons practicing Orthotics, Prosthetics, or Pedorthics in Ohio must be licensed pursuant to legislation enacted into law on October 27, 2000. The law, Chapter 4779 of the Revised Code, created the State Board of Orthotics, Prosthetics, and Pedorthics to administer licensing requirements.

The Board members were appointed by Governor Bob Taft and include: Ron Kidd, CPO (Grove City), President; Mike Marmer, BOC, C. Ped (Cincinnati) Vice President; Jack Reser, C. Ped. (Bellefontaine) Secretary; Mark Horwitz, CO (Dayton); Julie Bush, BOC (Grove City); Thomas Lee, M.D. (Worthington); and Steve LaForge, Esq. (Galloway).

I realize that many of you still are unsure about some issues of the law or have heard many rumors regarding the board. I encourage you to please take the time to call me or e-mail me with your questions or concerns. I have made a list of the most frequently asked questions and have answered them for you as well. I hope this information is useful for you.

Q. *Do I send in \$125.00 for each application completed?*

A. No, there is a \$125.00 application fee per applicant.

Q. *Do I have to get a passport photo; they are so expensive?*

A. No, please do not go to a great expense for your photo. I have received computer shots of individuals (shoulders and up), individuals cut out of group photos and driver's license photos.

Q. *Can anyone go to your Board Meetings?*

A. Yes, the State Board of Orthotics, Prosthetics, and Pedorthics is subject to the requirements of the Open Meetings Act pursuant to Chapter 119. To find out more information on when meetings are scheduled you may visit our website at www.ohio.gov/bopp or contact the board office.

Q. *How soon will I hear from someone once I've sent in my application?*

A. Once your application form has been received, I briefly look it over and will contact applicants if I see anything missing. Applications are then given to the review committee of the Board. A letter will then be sent out to all applicants regarding their licensure status. Letters are planned to be sent in early August, and will continue as new applications are received.

Q. *I work with a group of people who will be sending in their application forms, can we send them all together, and with one check?*

A. Yes, the Board's intent is to try and make this transition as easy and convenient for you as possible, therefore it would

The Ohio Chapter—AAOP held its annual Spring Conference, *2001 A Brace (and limb) Odyssey*, on March 31st. As has been the case in each of the past six years, the Ohio Chapter once again enjoyed its largest meeting ever. Over 230 O&P professionals, technicians, C.Peds and BOC's from seven states (as well as one attendee from Canada) enjoyed this top-notch professional program in an exciting location.

Presenters included very popular return presenters, James Campbell, Ph.D., CO, Kevin Carroll, M.S., CP, FAAOP and Deanna Fish, M.S., CPO, FAAOP. Campbell, Carroll and Fish always provide exciting and informative presentations. First time presenters, Mike Schuch, CPO, FAAOP of Duke University Medical Center, and Mike Thompkins, President of Animated Prosthetics, Inc., brought a treasure trove of 21st century information on myoelectric systems from their research and development work. Schuch's and Tompkin's work has been featured on a number of recent television shows, including the Discovery Channel and the Discovery Health Channel.

Jim Walker, CO, of NOPCO—another first-timer—presented a well-received program on hybrid orthoses for neuromuscular scoliosis. Frank Friddle, Jr., CPO of Friddle's Orthopedic Appliances,

another newcomer, presented a fascinating session on the use of color and plastics in orthotics.

A panel of great professionals from Ohio rounded out this Spring's array of presenters: Ron Kidd, CPO, Mark Bondurant, CPO, Randy Daniel, CP, Manuel Garcia, CP and Glen Schober, CP. Licensure, of course, has been an important topic at every Ohio meeting for the past five years. Ron Kidd—one of the key individuals steering this issue through its many twists and turns—had the honor of announcing to attendees the official passage of Ohio's licensure bill.

The Spring meeting hosts the largest number of exhibitors outside of the national meeting. Fifty-seven companies displayed their services and products. This represents the sixth year of an average annual increase of 10% in number of exhibitors. Most exhibitors are delighted to come to the Ohio meeting and find their time well spent. Attendee evaluations show that the feeling is mutual.

While the Ohio Chapter's meetings are one-day intensive sessions, the site of this year's Spring Conference was very friendly for those who came from a distance. Held in Columbus' brand new Easton Town Center, there was plenty for attendees (and their families) to do for the entire weekend. Easton Town Center is a

village concept developed by Les Wexner of Columbus (*Victoria's Secret, The Limited, The Gap*) and the actor, Arnold Swartzenegger. A short walk across the street from the Hilton, the Easton is set against a casual village backdrop consisting of indoor and outdoor entertainment, dining and shopping venues.

The Spring Meeting also was one of the first to book with the brand new state-of-the-art three-star Hilton Hotel adjacent to the Easton. Like the Easton, the Hilton did not disappoint.
